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The affair began in 2011 when it was revealed that a group of parents had approached a local school, Edgbaston High School for Girls, to introduce a new curriculum. The proposed curriculum was based on the principles of Islam and other non-Western religions, and it was claimed that it would be taught alongside the existing curriculum. The school initially agreed to the proposal, but soon faced pressure from the local council and other stakeholders to withdraw it. The affair became a major political issue, with both sides presenting their own versions of the story. In 2012, the government announced that it would investigate the affair, and a report was published in 2013. The report concluded that there was no evidence of any wrongdoing, but it did highlight concerns about the way in which the affair had been handled. The affair has since become a symbol of the tensions between different religious groups in British society, and it has raised questions about the role of religion in education.



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
